EDITOR'S NOTES

Another summer has come and gone. It's hard to believe it is fall already. Soon we'll be preparing our snow plow trucks for a long winter ahead. We are very lucky that, due to the milder than normal winter last year, we have over 200 tons of salt in storage to start this winter.

For those of you who are contracted with Universal Disposal for your garbage pickup, you should soon be noticing a new hauler picking up your trash. As of September 1, 2016, Waste Management has acquired Universal Disposal and will be taking over the entire business. Their location will be the same at 9954 Old State Road, Chardon. You should have received a letter from Waste Management by now explaining about the changes in billing. Everything else remains the same including your pick up day. This could change as they work to consolidate schedules with other communities they serve. If you have recycling, there will be no changes at this time. If schedules do change, we have been told that garbage and recycling pickups will still be on the same day. If you have any questions, you can call Waste Management at 888-246-8081 and they will be glad to help you.

The Curbside Recycling program has continued to grow with over 600 residents participating in Perry Township and Perry Village. North Perry is not included because they have their own contract. If you do not recycle and would like to start, the cost for recycling is \$4.00 per month which includes a toter and it is picked up every other week. Again, you can call Waste Management to make arrangements to begin curbside recycling pickup.

If you have not seen the new access driveway from Clark Road to the beach on the west side of the Community Center you may want to check it out. The drive winds down through a ravine and allows access to the beach area without crossing the ballfields. There is plenty of parking available and a walkway down to the beach area which has been enhanced by the installation of groins a few years ago to protect our shoreline. Take advantage of the nice weather before winter and ride down to the see the new beach access from Clark Road.

The Township Service Department has finished with the installation of the retention basin in the Circle Drive subdivision. This property was acquired a few years ago and the Lake County Land Bank paid for the removal of the house on the property. This lot is the lowest point in the subdivision and water ponding after large storms has always been a problem. With the grade of the retention basin, it will now drain and not hold water permanently.

Members of the society extend their special thanks to all donors and contributors who helped to make the annual event a success. Proceeds from this sole fundraiser held by the society are used to keep the Perry Historical Society operative throughout the year. The Perry Historical museum, opened to all throughout the day, also had many visitors who took time to browse throughout the interesting displays and history information of the Perry community.

President Don Densmore reported that the four students from Perry High School who attended the Buckeye Boys' and Girls' State program in June were **Matthew Huston, Evan Mills, Jesse Nadinic** and **Colin Reichman**. Perry Historical Society sponsors one Perry High School Junior to attend. Other sponsors are Perry High School, Perry AMVETS and the American Legion. No girls applied this year, so four boys were sent to Bowling Green University for the program. For those who are not aware of this program, Don reported that Buckeye Boys' State is a program of Ohio and is held at Bowling Green University for 8 days each June.

Participants in the Buckeye Boys' State program are exposed to fundamental democratic principles in local, county and state elections and governmental functions which prepare them for leadership roles as patriotic American citizens. The program was established in 1936 and is the single largest in the nation.

Buckeye Boys' State averages over 1200 delegates annually from over five hundred Ohio High

Schools, home schooled students, and online students. There have been over 90,000 participants since 1936. It is a premier youth program in Ohio, and is the Number One American Legion Boys' State program in the nation. Each participant was able to share their interesting experience at a meeting held on August 8th at the Perry United Methodist Church. Well attended, the annual meeting is open to all who are interested. The Perry Historical Society congratulates each one of this year's chosen participants.

The Perry community seemed to come alive on Saturday, September 17th, when many people attended a celebration recognizing **Perry Coal and Feed Company** for its 100th year of business. Among the many attendees were officials from Perry High School, Perry Village, Perry Township, Perry Fire Department and many other local organizations to congratulate present **owner Rick Warren** and his employees for their dedication in serving the community so well over past years. A special historical plaque was presented by Secretary **Kathy Smith** of the Perry Historical Society to Rick that recognizes the Perry Coal and Feed structure, located just off Main Street in Perry Village, as an historic building in Perry. He also received several other recognition resolutions from other officials of the community. Rick generously invited everyone to enjoy a "hog roast" dinner he sponsored for all in attendance to enjoy. Congratulations to the Perry Coal and Feed Company, one of the most well known businesses in Perry for its one hundred years of business. If passed, this renewal levy will cost a \$100,000.00 market value homeowner \$79.62 per year and generate \$1,178,072 per year for the operation of Fire and Rescue services to all of Perry.

DON'T WAIT – CHECK THE DATE!!

Every October, the National Fire Protection Association and your Perry Fire Department highlights the nationwide fire protection campaign to teach the importance of fire safety education. This year's theme focuses on a very important activity – replacing your smoke alarms every 10 years. Age matters when it comes to smoke alarms: **CHECK THE DATE** and replace your smoke alarms if they are 10 years old.

Smoke alarm basics:

- ✓ Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of your home (including the basement).
- ✓ For the best protection, interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the house. When one sounds, they all sound.
- ✓ Test alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- ✓ Replace smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.
- ✓ Replace smoke detector batteries at least once a year.
- ✓ Senior citizens are asked to call the Perry Fire Department and we will be more than happy to change the batteries for you.
- ✓ Make sure everyone in your home knows the sound and understands what to do when they hear the smoke alarm.
- ✓ Think about who in your home might need assistance in case of a fire.
- ✓ Create a home fire escape plan for your home and practice it.
- ✓ If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside, go to your safe meeting place and call 911 from your neighbors house.

PERRY CENTER

During the last quarter, activities have been relatively normal in terms of food/rent/utility assistance. We did experience one attempted fraud involving rent assistance which was easily detected by safeguards in place for such cases. Eight children ages 6 to 12 were sent to Camp NEOSA in Carrollton, Ohio from July 25 through August 2 (at no cost to their parents). School supplies were provided for 80 students returning to classes. We assisted a client with a prescription that was costing them \$175/month by locating a coupon at a cost of \$33/month – no cost to the Center but saving the client \$142.

Now our attention turns to Thanksgiving and Christmas. Thanksgiving and Christmas can be a joyous time with parties, celebrations, special worship services and, of course, gifts. However, for too many, it can be a time of sadness, loneliness and stress. Imagine a mother of three young children whose husband is ill, you realize that she cannot work as well as take care of her husband and children. Add Christmas to that and the mother is overwhelmed by the situation and heartbroken that she cannot provide the Christmas for her family that she and her husband would like. The Perry Center cannot fix all of the ills of the holiday season. However, we do provide as much support as we can to make Thanksgiving and Christmas as joyous as possible. This includes the routine assistance with food, rent and utilities. In addition, we provide clients with turkeys/chickens at Thanksgiving as well as food boxes and gifts at Christmas.

How can you help?

- Adopt-a-Family – Adopt-a-Family, administered by the Perry Center, provides families with boxes of food, as well as gifts for the children and the parents. Donors are provided with wish lists for their adopted family – these items are purchased, wrapped and brought to the Center. The Center provides food boxes appropriately sized for the families involved and distributes all of the items just prior to Christmas.
- Christmas Boxes – Every individual/family who requests assistance receives a generous box of food (80 items). In addition, we try to ensure every person receives gifts as well. We ask the client to tell us on the application form what it is they need/would like. If it is within reason, we try to provide the item requested. This is an area where individual donors are especially important. For example, last year we had requests from five children for bicycles – donors, that called to ask what we needed, provided all of the bicycles. Often these special requests are for relatively inexpensive items such as blankets, pillows, coats, gloves, underwear, pet food, grooming products, gift cards for a meal out and so on. We have children ages 13-18 for which Toys for Tots does not provide gifts – gift cards are nice for these individuals. If someone has a better idea, we would love your help with this group. In addition to providing items to be included in the Christmas boxes, help is always needed in terms of setting up (12/17/16), packing (12/19/16) and distributing the boxes (12/20/16).
- Salvation Army Bell Ringing – roughly one-third of the income for the Perry Center comes from the Red Kettle Campaign at Christmas. Bell ringing starts the Friday before Thanksgiving. Those, who have rung before, know how enjoyable this time is. It is a real thrill when you realize you were manning the kettle at a time when someone came by, slipped in \$800 and kept on going without saying a word (actual happening).

STORM WATER POLLUTION PREVENTION TIPS

- Never allow any chemicals, yard wastes or any other materials to be washed down or put into storm drains. These drains may bypass the wastewater treatment plant and go directly to lakes or rivers.
- If you must buy an item that is potentially hazardous, be sure to buy only as much as you need, and follow the instructions on the label for proper use, storage and disposal. Save unused materials for a local household hazardous waste collection event. For more information, contact your local solid waste management district.
- Use a garbage can for trash and recycle reusable materials. Improperly discarded trash may be carried by runoff into the storm sewer.
- Never allow roof gutters to drain directly to the street or storm sewer. Allow drainage from the roof to flow over your lawn instead.
