From the desk of...

On Thursday, June 27th, the Public Meeting to present the Champion Farm Planning Study was held. There were approximately 70 residents in attendance. The study findings were presented by the consulting group of **Economic Development Solutions**. Good dialogue took place regarding the study. We had a number of people who could not attend that requested a copy of the study. The study can be viewed on our website, www.perrytownship-lake.com. Once again, it was stressed that this is a planning study, not a specific plan for the property.

Commissioner Jerry Cirino was gracious enough to join us for the meeting and reported on the current status of the Power Plant. The Commissioner was as optimistic as he has been these past few months. Commissioner Cirino has been an instrumental voice in many of the Power Plant discussions. He deserves great credit for his time and energy spent on this matter. A question was addressed to Commissioner Cirino regarding the status of the Vrooman Road Bridge. The Commissioner responded with, "You can't put toothpaste back in the tube." He went on to say that this needs to be a high-level bridge and we need to get it done. The project is moving forward with bids due in mid-July.

Perry Township has a yard waste drop-off facility at the Service Garage located at 4720 Webb Road. This is open Monday thru Friday from 7:30 am - 3:00 pm and every Saturday from 8:00 am - Noon. This facility can accept yard waste and tree trimmings up to 4 foot long and any diameter. No construction debris, railroad ties, pallets or dimensional lumber can be accepted at this location. Dumping areas are marked accordingly.

It's not too late to sign up for the Summer Swim Program at the YMCA Outdoor Family Center located on River Road. The cost per household for Perry Residents (proof of residency required) is only \$50. The program runs now thru September 3rd. You can register on-line at www.theoutdoorymca.org. This is a great facility to spend those hot summer days with your family at a reasonable price.

Just a reminder that the Summer Concert Series started on July 11th. They run every Wednesday from 7-9 pm through August 22nd. Check the Township website for the band schedule.

PERRY CENTER

One of the most worthwhile and well-received programs in recent history is the **Pirate Power Packs** - a joint venture between **Perry Service Learning** and the Perry Center. With this program, students who are eligible for free/reduced cost lunches during the week receive backpacks each Friday containing 3 dinners, 2 lunches and 2 breakfasts. This is designed to provide nutritious meals during the weekend. The concern regarding this program is that there is no similar provision for the summer. As such, when it was learned in March that the Ohio Department of Education would provide the necessary funds, we decided to pursue a summer feeding program in conjunction with the Library. Although it is recommended that applications for this program begin in the Fall, we were able to hurry the process and were at approval stage by the end of the school year. Throughout this process, the concern was that the space for 48 children at the library would not be sufficient. Although fliers were sent home by the school and every effort was made to notify clients and the public at large, the response was shockingly low - ONE. In talking with clients, we learned that there definitely is a need, but the problem is that most parents work and have no way to get their children to the library. We are currently working on a way to provide the backpacks - either by the parents picking them up or by providing delivery.

The regularly provided assistance has been down slightly - including food, rent and utilities. We are, however, busy signing up children for summer camp for the first week of August in Carrollton, Ohio. This is a Salvation Army program free to all children from 6-12 years of age. Those that have attended in the past have been pleased with the wide variety of activities. Once they have experienced this camp, they return year after year. In addition, applications for school supplies have been sent to all clients with school aged children. Backpacks are provided with supplies specified by the schools.

We are still in need of volunteers - second Administrator (particularly in time for the holidays) as well as an individual to pick up donations from Aldi and/or Target. If interested, call **Carole Martin (259-3332)** or **Art Buser (440-796-0087)**.

Hours for the Perry Center are Tuesday at 9 am - noon and Friday from 1 - 4 pm. If needed an appointment can be made in the evening - call 259-3332.

PERRY JOINT FIRE DISTRICT

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for attending our annual Pancake Breakfast. As always, it was well attended and an excellent opportunity for our community and citizens to interact with one another. We appreciate the support from our community members. As always, if you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to call the station at **440-259-2880** or e-mail me at jmcdonald@perryfire.info. We have been awarded through FEMA, \$80,000.00 to replace our 1994 grass truck. We are currently in the process of completing the new grass unit. This vehicle has been totally paid for by federal funds. We have also been awarded \$33,080.00 in federal funds for radiological detection meters and four gas meters that read oxygen, co levels and LEL (lower explosive limits). Lastly, we have also been awarded \$15,000.00 for two gear extracting machines to help keep our turnout gear clean. It is just one of the many preventative measures to reduce the risk of cancer to our firefighters. Have a safe and happy summer.

Happy summer everyone. Recently, the Perry Joint Fire District mailed invoices to those who rent the residential "knox box" from us. This annual cost to rent a box creates a sustainable stock of boxes for those who like to rent these units. These units are used to store a key to your home that would allow the Paramedics to gain access to you during a medical emergency. If you are interested in this service, please call the fire prevention office at **259-3249**. I would also like to remind our residents on the recreational fire laws that are present in Ohio:

"Recreational fire". *An outdoor fire burning materials other than rubbish where the fuel being burned is not contained in an incinerator, outdoor fireplace, portable outdoor fireplace, barbeque grill or barbeque pit and has a total fuel area of 3 feet (914 mm) or less in diameter and 2 feet (610 mm) or less in height for pleasure, religious, ceremonial, cooking, warmth or similar purposes. (a) 307.1.1. Prohibited open burning.* *Open burning shall be prohibited when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fires hazardous. Wind that sends smoke onto another's property and creates a nuisance to them is prohibited and will be extinguished by the homeowner. "Ozone Action Days or Air Quality Alerts" also prohibit outdoor burning. These are some of the more common issues our department faces, but other factors can also be cause for extinguishment such as prolonged dry weather.* Please be a good neighbor when enjoying recreational fires this summer.

Hello, I hope everyone had a great spring. We are now headed into July, which means plenty of sunshine. "We Hope" and that means we should be mindful of protecting our skin and eyes. We also should be cautious around pools, lakes, rivers, oceans and creeks. I would like to provide you with some safety tips and general information about these hazards.

Children and youth are at an increased risk for drowning during these summer months. Parents should closely monitor their children's play during water activities. Here are some important water safety tips:

- 1) **Never swim alone.** Always have a buddy with you when you swim.
- 2) **Be on the lookout;** supervise young children at all times around bathtubs, swimming pools, ponds, lakes and other bodies of water.
- 3) **Make life jackets a "must."** Make sure all kids wear life jackets (also known as personal flotation devices or PFDs) in and around natural bodies of water, such as lakes, rivers and ponds, even if they know how to swim. The PFD must be: U.S. Coast Guard approved Type I, II, III, or V; in good serviceable condition and the appropriate size. **Ohio law requires children under the age of 10** to wear a PFD at all times on boats under 18 feet long.

Sun Protection: Skin cancer is the most-commonly diagnosed cancer in the United States; it accounts for about half of all cancers in the United States. Here are some helpful tips to protect yourself from the sun:

- Wear protective clothing such as long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Wear a wide-brimmed hat that shades your face, neck and ears.
- Seek shade whenever possible.
- Wear sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher as well as UVA and UVB protection.
- Re-apply sunscreen regularly, especially after swimming, perspiring heavily or drying skin with a towel.
- Wear sunglasses that block both UVA and UVB rays.
- Avoid direct sun exposure between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when the sun's rays are strongest.

Heat Safety: Never leave your child alone in the car – not even for a minute! Place a cell phone, purse, briefcase, gym bag or whatever is to be carried from the car, on the floor in front of a child in a backseat. This triggers adults to see children when they open the rear door and reach for their belongings.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion: Heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea and vomiting. Those of highest risk for heat stroke or heat exhaustion are: infants and children up to 4 years of age, people 65 years of age or older and people who are on certain medications or are ill. Drink plenty of fluids and avoid alcohol and caffeine; they can add to dehydration and increase the effects of heat illness. Have a safe, fun and enjoyable summer vacation.

STORMWATER POLLUTION SOLUTIONS

Lawn Care - Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.

- * Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- * Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- * Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.

Auto Care - Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody.

- * Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.
- * Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.
